Gravestone Stories is a research-driven public history project and digital museum documenting Alexandria's historic burial grounds — including the more than 35,000 burials of the Wilkes Street Cemetery Complex — and the extraordinary lives behind the stones.

Built over more than a decade by public historian David Heiby, superintendent of the Presbyterian Cemetery & Columbarium, its research has been cited by Wikipedia, the Library of Virginia's *Dictionary of Virginia Biography*, and the National Register nomination for the Wilkes Street Cemetery Complex.

REVOLUTIONARY WAR WALKING TOUR

Rebellious Scoundrels: The Patriots of Alexandria's Presbyterian Meeting House

"These are a set of rebellious scoundrels..."

— Nicholas Cresswell, Loyalist diarist, 1774

He meant it as an insult. We wear it as a badge. Walk the 18th-century burial ground of today's Old Presbyterian Meeting House and its sanctuary, rebuilt in 1837 after fire claimed the 1775 original. Meet the congregation a Loyalist loved to hate, including Dr. James Craik, Washington's physician and lifelong friend, then pay your respects at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier of the American Revolution, at rest here in Alexandria.
