A History Buried in Plain Sight

Within a single square mile in Alexandria lies a landscape holding more than 35,000 stories — and among them, the untold stories of African Americans who endured enslavement, fought for freedom, served in uniform, built institutions, and ultimately forced this city to change.

BORN FROM CRISIS

After the 1803 Yellow Fever epidemic, Alexandria’s churches established new burial grounds just outside city limits on Spring Garden Farm in Fairfax County. Annexed into the city in 1915, these thirteen cemeteries now preserve more than two centuries of American history.

WHY THIS TOUR EXISTS

African American history is not a footnote to Alexandria’s story — it is the story. These are people who shaped history without receiving credit for it — and this tour restores their voices.

Commissioned by Old Presbyterian Meeting House’s Dismantling Racism Team in 2026, this tour was built from court records, pension files, family papers, and archaeological reports — original research by public historian David Heiby.

AN INNOVATIVE FORMAT

At each stop, participants receive laminated cards and read the words of a historical figure in the first person — their own voice, reconstructed from the historical record. The experience moves from grave to grave, building a cumulative portrait of a community that endured, resisted, and transformed.

Voices of the Tour

Twenty-three original voices — each an individual composition built from court records, pension files, newspaper accounts, and family papers. Many of these individuals had never been written about before this tour.

ENSLAVEMENT

- **Caroline Branham** — Enslaved chambermaid — the first to know Washington was dying
- **Mary & Emily Edmonson** — Pearl fugitives — captured, sold to New Orleans, and redeemed
- **Paul Jennings** — Pearl escape organizer — White House servant, self-freed author
- **Townsend & Mary Derricks** — Husband and wife who fled in 1857 — she was captured; his account reached William Still’s Underground Rail Road
- **Gazaway Bugg Lamar** — Confederate banker — father of the Wanderer’s financier

MILITARY SERVICE

- **Shadrach Murphy** — 23rd USCT — his death sparked the petition that integrated a U.S. military cemetery
- **Tobias Trout** — Fifer, 31st USCT — refused an unjust order
- **Alfred Whiting** — Sergeant, 54th Massachusetts Infantry — survived everything, then didn’t
- **Joseph Harris & John Pipsico** — Revolutionary War veterans who fought before the nation decided what to do with them

EDUCATION

- **Laura Missouri Dorsey** — Teacher — forty-nine years, one day missed
- **Rosier Lyles** — Teacher — forty-six years, one classroom at a time
- **Gladys Quander Tancil** — Mount Vernon’s first African American female guide

CIVIL RIGHTS & POLITICS

- **George Lewis Seaton** — Legislator — “I built Alexandria, and Alexandria lost me”
- **Fields Cook** — Minister, author, and civil rights leader
- **Julius Campbell** — T.C. Williams co-captain — the true story behind *Remember the Titans*

INJUSTICE

- **Joseph McCoy** — Lynched on false accusations, April 23, 1897
- **Benjamin Thomas** — Lynched August 8, 1899 — sixteen years old

David Heiby is not a scripted guide — he is the researcher who found these stories. As Superintendent of the Presbyterian Cemetery & Columbarium for more than a decade and founder of Gravestone Stories, he has documented more than 35,000 burials and produced nearly 400 individual biographical profiles.

The first-person voices on this tour are his original compositions — drawn from court records, pension files, newspaper accounts, and family papers. Many of these individuals had never been written about before. David found them, and gave them back their voices.
